#### Te Taunaki | Recommendation(s)

It is recommended that Te Pūkenga Council (the Council):

a. Note the update on current issues, key achievements and highlights arising during the reporting period.

#### Korero Whakapopoto | Executive Summary

Since the last Council meeting, we have announced the timeframes for the next phase of consultation to all kaimahi, which will include Academic Centre and Learning Systems (ACLS), Ako Delivery, Learner and Employer Experience and Attraction (LEEA) and Tiriti Outcomes business groups plus some functions within the Office of the Chief Executive (OCE). We will consult on the proposed organisation structure from 12 June for five weeks.

Since my last update to you, we have confirmed seven of the eight Ako Network Directors, appointed regional co-leads for two of our divisions, onboarded the People Culture and Wellbeing and Digital leaders, and commenced recruitment for the Finance and Property leaders.

#### Ngā mahi matua i te wā o te pūrono | Key activity during reporting period

The *Manaaki* - *Cyclone Gabrielle and Auckland floods fund* was established to remove the barriers that impacted ākonga face following the significant weather events so they could continue study and training. The first round of the fund was oversubscribed, and therefore we opened up a second round.

The fund has been an excellent example of collaboration across Te Pūkenga business divisions, led by the Learner Journey team in LEEA, working with Digital, Finance, OCE namely Communications as well as provider-based and work-based business divisions to rapidly establish and implement the fund. Learner feedback has been overwhelmingly positive and we will continue to assess the applications.

Te Pūkenga EIT Hawke's Bay has partnered with the Hastings District Council and the Hastings Health Centre to use their facilities for teaching and learning. The partnership with the Council has provided the School of Nursing a temporary home and enabled more than 100 ākonga to continue their studies.

The announcement regarding the closure of Te Pūkenga Southern Institute of Technology Music and Audio Institute of New Zealand campus in Auckland on 4 April 2023, attracted media queries. As

indicated at last month's Council meeting, this was not a decision taken lightly and we appreciate the impact that the closure will have on ākonga and kaimahi at the campus. We are providing support as far as possible to kaimahi through the Employee Assistance Programme and working directly with learners to help them complete or redirect their studies.

The decision has reinforced the importance of our work with Ohu Mahi | Workforce Development Councils (WDCs) to design programmes that both meet industry needs and are financially sustainable. We will be working with Toi Mai, the WDC for creative, cultural, recreation and technology sectors, to further advance this.

The recent announcements of redundancies at the University of Otago and Massey University in the face of financial challenges were another reminder of the stress that the tertiary education sector is under. We have felt the same pressures in enrolments and are working on a financial resilience and sustainability plan which we will workshop with Council. Our strategy includes a focus on our learners and their need to access online, on-the-job and on campus training and ensure that their skills are more readily applicable. While we are seeing growing interest from international students, processing of visa applications by Immigration New Zealand remains challenging.

Te Pūkenga will appear before the Education and Workforce Committee (Select Committee) for our annual review on 31 May 2023, following the tabling of our 2022 annual report. This annual review will be the first time that we report on the whole organisation and we are working on compiling information from each business division to respond to the standard 144 pre-hearing questions for 2022.

Since the last Council meeting, we have announced to all kaimahi the timeframes for the next phase of the organisation design consultation. It will commence on 12 June 2023 for five weeks and include the design of four business groups – ACLS, Ako Delivery, LEEA, Tiriti Outcomes – as well as some functions of the OCE. Prior to that consultation, I will be having kanohi ki te kanohi hui with kaimahi around the country and will be joined by my leadership team. It will be a good opportunity to listen and answer any questions that kaimahi may have.

We recently announced the appointment of seven out of eight National Ako Directors, who will take up their new positions throughout April and May 2023. The seven appointees are:

- Community, Health, Social Services and Education Dr Angela Beaton (Kirikiriroa)
- Creative, Technology and Recreation Amanda Whitaker (Waihōpai)
- Engineering, Logistics and Manufacturing Mike Crossan (Te Whanganui a Tara | Wellington).
- Food and Fibre Andrea Leslie (Timaru)
- Foundation and Pathways Koren Hopoi (Tauranga)
- Mātauranga Māori Layelin Stewart (Te Kuiti)
- Services Di Lithgow (Tāmaki Makaurau | Auckland)

Recruitment for the remaining National Ako Director role (Construction and Infrastructure) is continuing. We hope to announce this appointment in coming weeks.

We have extended offers to Regional Director Co-Leaders for Rohe 3 | Region 3 and are interviewing applicants for Rohe 4 |Region 4 during the first week of May.

I presented to Komiti Māori and the Interim Learner Advisory Committee last week and shared with them the current issues and priorities for the leadership team including the current financial position, enrolments, our response to the Cyclone, programme unification and mix of provision for 2024, our

partnerships with Workforce Development Councils (WDCs) as well as pricing/course fees/employer charges for 2024. I also testing our strategic thinking with them, which we will be part of the Vision and Phasing session of the Council workshop. I will meet with the Interim Kaimahi Advisory Committee next week and look forward to continuing regular engagement with these important advisory committees.

During the past month:

- We welcomed the first 30 ākonga of an innovative new cybersecurity qualification with a pōwhiri onto Te Noho Kotahitanga Marae at Unitec | Te Pūkenga. The qualification is a collaboration between Te Pūkenga, Microsoft, Te Whatu Ora and TupuToa. It has been developed to both address the huge growth in demand for cyber security experts and the under-representation of Māori and Pacific people in the tech sector.
- Connexis | Te Pūkenga announced that it is offering ākonga access to a financial assistance fund with grants of up to \$3,000 if they are struggling in their training programme. The money comes from the <u>Infrastructure Education & Training Charitable Trust</u>.
- The Project (current affairs programme on TV3) interviewed a recent graduate of Toi Ohomai
   | Te Pūkenga. The graduate's son performed an emotional haka at her graduation and the video went viral on Tik Tok. The Herald also covered the story.
- Wintec | Te Pūkenga has set up a new ākonga-assisted health and well-being service for the local community. The service gets patients via referrals from community partners, through Te Kotahi Oranga | Health and Wellness Centre webpage, and word of mouth. The service is free and available for anyone in the community who meets the criteria of needing help in one of four areas- type 2 diabetes, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD), adult asthma and at risk of falls.
- MITO | Te Pūkenga had 580 secondary school enrolments into micro-credentials last term. The majority of these enrolments are for MITO's StartUp<sup>®</sup> micro-credential which is an industry-approved introduction to the automotive industry including both eLearning and practical workplace learning, offered to year 11-13 students.


